**Caspar David Friedrich to Picasso** 

> October 14th, 2018 to February 17th, 2019

In a spectacular show with important loans from museums and private collections, the Kurpfälzisches Museum (Palatinate Museum) Heidelberg illuminates the imaginary in modern art and its roots in romanticism.

"I found a new one: True art is practicing unreality. The highest!" Thus wrote Lovis Corinth (1858 – 1925) at the end of his life in his diary. In doing so, the painter questions a principle of the fine arts that has been valid for centuries: the goal of faithful imitation of nature. Around 1900 the artists of the avant-garde made a radical break and created "Unrealities": Color and form became independent and at the same time had symbolic character. It is no longer the external world, but the inner life, the feeling of the artist, that takes center stage. The roots of this new imaginative art lie already in romanticism. Caspar David Friedrich is one of its outstanding protagonists.

From October 14th, 2018, to February 17th, 2019, the Kurpfälzisches Museum presents these connections in a special exhibition with outstanding loans from artists such as Francisco de Goya, Caspar David Friedrich, Lovis Corinth, Edvard Munch, Franz von Stuck, Giorgio de Chirico, Emil Nolde, Ernst Ludwig Kirchner, Max Pechstein and Pablo Picasso. Among the lenders are renowned museums such as the Hamburger Kunsthalle, the Würth Collection, the Städel Museum, the Kunstmuseum Basel and the Fondazione Carima in Macerata. In addition, works from exclusive private collections that have rarely or never been shown to the public before will be on show.

The exhibition spans the period from around 1800 to classical modernism of the early 20th century and beyond. Especially in the juxtaposition of romantic and modern works, the concept of unreality and its development become particularly vivid. The focus is on five

main topics: Romantic, symbolist and expressionist forest, mountain and sea landscapes illustrate the "symbolization of the landscape" in the first exhibition area. Mysterious and eerie "images of the inner being and the unconscious" of masters like Goya, Munch, Böcklin and Kubin follow. The psyche and basic conditions of human existence are also at the center of the unreal imagery that Stuck, de Chirico and others evoke with mythological representations, the "New Myths". The fourth section is devoted to the different artistic strategies of "reality-smashing" that determine the work of the expressionists, cubists and futurists. The tour culminates in "Abstraction and nonrepresentationalism". Pictures by Alexandra Exter and Josef Albers from the Marli Hoppe-Ritter Collection, for example, show "pure color" and at the same time address its perception by the viewer.

We are very grateful to the Friends of KMH for their generous support in the design and realisation of the exhibition. Without them "Unrealities" would not have been possible.

Caspar David Friedrich's symbolically charged landscapes stand for the subjectification of art in Romanticism: They served as a projection surface for the sensations of both the artist and the viewer. At the same time, they convey a deep longing for a universal context, which is conjured up in the work of art.






